






















Editor's Welcome

Bridgnorth nomination and voting are taken at sub-branch meetings.









Shropshire (ider & Perry Trail

Welcome to the Shropshire Cider and Perry Trail which is now incorporated for the first time in Shropshire TAles. The first Shropshire Cider and Perry Trail took place in 2005 with only just under thirty pubs participating.

Cider is fermented apple juice, perry is fermented pear juice. There are relatively few outlets for perry.

CAMRA supports traditional cask conditioned cider and perry as opposed to keg which has additional carbon dioxide injected into it and which is served too cold.

Cider from the west of England, the Welsh Marches and from Wales is produced from cider apples, of which there are over 300 varieties. Cider from East Anglia, Kent and the South of England comes primarily from cooking and dessert apples. A feature of recent years has been cider from outside these traditional areas above, such as Yorkshire, the East Midlands, the North West and Scotland.

The overwhelming proportion of Perry is produced in Herefordshire, Gloucestershire and Monmouthshire from perry pears, of which there are at least 200+ varieties. Such pears tend to be small and hard and are not generally for eating.

Most cider and perry consists of blends of different varieties but some single varieties may be found, normally at Beer, Cider and Perry Festivals organised by CAMRA. Kingston Black is the single variety cider often found and for perry it is Blakeney Red.

Cider and perry have an average Alcohol By Volume (ABV) higher than beer. 6.5%+ compared to 4%+, any cider or perry with an ABV of 8.5%+ is classified as apple or pear wine.

Brewery News

Clun Brewery

The construction of the new Clun Brewery is proceeding. Vessels in place with other works including drainage to follow.

Corvedale Brewery

To clarify from the previous editions news Corvedale still do have a range of beers being produced, it is only Farmer Ray's Ale, Fuggles Gold, Norman's Pride and Katie's Pride that are no longer being brewed with a new bitter having been added.

Finney's Brewery

Finney's produced a new cask ale for CAMRA's Mild in May event. MildSide is a 4.2%ABV ruby mild and debuted at The Cock Hotel and The Pheasant Inn in Wellington during May.

Hobsons Brewery

Hobsons Brewery kick-started May with the opening of Hobsons Kitchen Tap, their onsite brewery taproom in Cleobury Mortimer. The taproom will be open every week, Wednesday - Saturday, 10am - 8pm, with varied opening hours around public holidays. The taproom opened to the public for the first time on Thursday 2 May and has also been entered on to www.whatpub.com so that beer quality scores can be added by CAMRA members.

The brewery has once again been voted Brewery of the Year 2019 by members of Telford & East Shropshire CAMRA. The presentation took place at the Hobsons Kitchen Tap on Saturday 25 May.

Severn Ales

Bridgnorth has a

new brewery! Severn Valley Ales opened its doors to the public on Friday 3 May. Manager Chris Dayus welcomed visitors to the plant, situated off Faraday Drive on the eastern edge of Bridgnorth, offering the three ales currently being brewed, which are available in Bridgnorth and beyond. However, Chris has every expectation to be able to sell his ales in many more establishments. The beers are SVA, a 4% light coloured session ale made with extra pale malt; Cartway Gold, at 4.2% a fuller flavoured golden ale and Old Mo-

4.8% with a full flavour provided by Classic El Dorado and Simco hops from North America.

Rowton Brewery

They have done a brew in collaboration with Harper Adams University with Malting Barley grown completely autonomously using robotics which has been on in The Pheasant during June.

They have an investment planned in the form of making the cold store bigger at the Rowton site and also have plans in the pipeline to make a chocolate milk stout called Mulky Way.



Pub A CockHotel, 148 Holyhead Road, Wellington TF1 2DL

Opening times: Mon - Thu 4pm - 11.30pm & Fri - Sun noon - 11pm

This multi-award winning 18th century grade II listed coaching inn offers a warm welcome and boasts a good reputation for quality beer. Taken over in 2018 by Joule's, four of the main bars eight handpulls are dedicated to Joule's ales, including one for their seasonal ale, the other four handpulls include Hobson's Best plus three ever changing regional ales.



Distance to next pub: **1.2 miles - approx. 25 minutes**

Leave pub and turn left into Mill Bank in the direction of Wellington centre. The Railway pub is on your left, cross the junction with Prince's Street and turn left into Church walk. The church is in front. Continue straight ahead past the church and upon emerging on New Church Road cross diagonally to the left and enter a footpath which is well sign-posted. Continue along the footpath ignoring any paths to the sides until you emerge on Tan Bank opposite the Police station. Cross this road and enter another footpath. Emerge on Roseway turning right and then right again at the crossroads into Wrekin Road with the Wrekin Inn directly ahead.

Cross the main road heading toward Wellington centre passing the Wellington Civic & Leisure Centre on your right. Head into the main shopping area (passing the Raven, White Lion & Dun Cow pubs) and turn left into Market Street. Follow this to the end and the Pheasant Inn comes into view on the right.

Pub B Pheasant Inn, 54 Market Street, Wellington TF1 1DT

Opening times: Mon-Thu 11am-11pm; Fri & Sat 11am-midnight & Sun noon-10.30pm

The bar has nine handpulls devoted to real ale and traditional cider with all the keg fonts on the back wall of the bar. This is a tap house for Rowton Brewery where you can find three of their beers always available on the bar as well as Tiger from Everards. The other four handpulls rotate beers from both local and national breweries with the remaining two handpulls hosting the traditional cider.



Distance to next pub: 2.5 miles - approx. 60 minutes

Leave the pub turning right, at the crossroads turn right again to go over the railway bridge. Immediately turn right into Ten Tree Croft which runs parallel with the railway line. Continue ahead until you emerge on to Church Street with the church in front of you. Cross this road and walk through the church grounds on Lychgate Walk.

As you emerge on King Street the Plough pub is to your left and the railway station can be seen to your right. Cross at the island and turn left in to Constitution Hill, continue over the junction with Albert Road passing the college on either side of the road. Where the road turns to the left, carry on ahead and enter a pathway. Continue along a tarmacked pathway to the end (ignoring the kissing gate on the right). Turn right but do not go into the underpass, instead continue along a path which is below the main road above you on the left.

Pub B Pheasant Inn (continued)

Kia Motors comes into view and at a fence with railway line ahead, turn left under the main road bridge and walk parallel with the railway line. Turn left and leave the footpath before the second bridge, turn right over the bridge and continue to the large island.

At the island cross Haybridge Road and continue on ahead walking under the main railway line bridge. Immediately after the bridge climb a grass bank to open grassland with pylons in front of you. Follow the path ahead until you reach a bank, descend onto a hard block paved area and continue towards the houses. At the houses follow a path to the right running behind the houses and before you emerge look for steps on the right descending to woodland. Keep on this path until you meet a driveway with an underpass to your right. Turn left and follow this driveway up to the pub.

Pub Horseshoes Inn, Holyhead Road, Ketley TF1 5AE

Opening times: 11am - Midnight

This pub with a multi-level bar area and lounge is very welcoming to all. Pool, darts and dominoes are regularly played. The pub serves Sharp's Doom Bar as its regular beer with one changing beer which is usually from Wye Valley Brewery.



Distance to next pub: **1.4 miles - approx. 30 minutes**

Leave pub, immediately cross Holyhead Road and (with new homes to the left) take a driveway (Ketley Dingle) which goes off to the left. Climb a bank up onto to a footpath with the power sub-station in front of you. Follow for a short distance and then drop down to the left and walk alongside the metal fence of the sub-station.

Keeping the sub-station on your left and continue until you see the offices of the Shropshire Star on Waterloo Road. Cross Waterloo Road and enter Morgan Way. Turn left on Morgan way (passing Hutchinson Way on the right and Hendrie Close on the left) to meet a bridleway which is Red Lee. Turn right and continue ahead passing Ketley Hall. At the top of the hill turn left through a gateway into Ketley Paddock Mound with a pool to the right. Stay on this footpath, ignoring the steps down on the left and go through a kissing gate until you meet Shepherd's Lane. Turn right and then left to enter walkway between the houses. On emerging bear right, then left turn on Castle View and as you veer right, take an alleyway on the left which leads down to the main road. Cross the main road and enter a muddy tree-lined alleyway which descends down to Beveley Road. Turning right, continue to find the pub is ahead

Pub Compasses, 72 Beveley Road, Beveley TF2 6SD

Opening times: Mon 4pm - 8pm, Tue noon - 11pm, Wed & Thu 4pm - 11pm, Fri & Sat 2pm - 11pm & Sun noon - 8.30pm

Located on the original line of Watling Street, now by-passed, this pub is well worth seeking out. This place is really a pub of two halves! At the front is a traditional local inn with regular lively trade. At the rear is Jenko's 'Mongolian barbecue' restaurant located in a spectacular contemporary log cabin. Traditional roasts are served Sunday lunch-times. Cask ale can be taken in or ordered to accompany your meal. This pub serves two regular beers; Hobsons Best Bitter and Salopian Hop Twister with a further guest ale sourced locally.



Pub Compases (continued) Distance to next pub: 11.9 miles - approx. 50 minutes.

Leave the pub at the rear and head towards the far right hand corner of the car park. Ignore the path to the left and take the path to the right which climbs up towards the main road. Follow the path up and then continue left towards the railway line. Turn left under the road bridge next to the train line. As the concrete road bears to the right take a left turn and WITH EXTREME CARE cross the railway line through gates. Bear right and follow to meet Hadley Road, turn right and then left into Village Way. Follow to the end go on to a pathway at Ramshurst Court and on to Maurice Lee Avenue. At the junction with Hayward Parade go slightly left, but almost straight over in to Church Parade.

Take a footpath on the right leading uphill with apartments to the left. Take a sharp turn to the left, go right between two blocks of flats, bear right to a path up a bank. Follow the path up to the main road. Turn left on the road, cross to the right-hand side and go over the bridge with the main A442 underneath it.

Immediately after the bridge look for a hair-pin right turn to a path. This path runs parallel with the A442 road, continue along it to a car park, then right at Cockshutt Road. Go under the main road and cross the island into Oakengates centre. Market Street is straight ahead

Pub Crown Inn, Market Street, Oakengates TF2 6EA

Opening times: Noon - 11pm

This 1835 pub has three distinct drinking areas and sun trap courtyard. With many guest beers from fourteen cooled hand pulls it is longstanding Cask Marque accredited. Real cider, mild, and a stout or porter usually available, and a range of continental bottled beers. Bus station at rear and a four minute walk from railway station. This pub serves two regular beers; Hobsons Best Bitter and Hobsons Twisted Spire with a further ten changing guest ales.



Pub **(F)** Station Hotel, 42 Market Street, Oakengates TF2 6DU

Opening times: Mon 11am - 9pm,
Tue - Sat 11am - 11pm & Sun noon - 11pm

A multi-roomed traditional local pub that has been in the Good Beer Guide for many years. A very warming fire in winter. Homemade Burger nights on a Monday and curries on a Wednesday. Excellent homemade Rolls, Pies and Cheeses are also usually available. This pub serves one regular beer in Bathams Best Bitter with eight changing guest ales usually from the Yorkshire counties.



Pub **G** Old Fighting Cocks, 48 Market Street, Oakengates TF2 6DU

Opening times: Mon - Thu 3.30pm - 11pm, Fri - Sat noon - 11.30pm & Sun noon -10.30pm

This cosy, central pub has rapidly become a firm favourite with ale drinkers, popular with locals. Its coach-house roots are clearly visible, with original stained glass windows and horse feeding hatch visible in the disabled toilet. In early 2019 the pub was acquired by Rowton Brewery.



Enjoy your cider or perry and contemplate which pub you are going to next but for more rural pubs please check ahead. The details for each pubs are correct at time of going to press, but please use the "WhatPub" website if you wish to confirm.

Ale by Bus... Edgmond and Newport

Written by Les Lumsdon and Harold Bound

Herefordshire CAMRA's transport correspondent, Les Lumsdon, joins forces with Shrewsbury member, Harold Bound, to introduce you to more beer, boots and buses.

This summer venture takes us to Edgmond and Newport in Telford and Wrekin. The three mile easy walk runs through farmland to join the towpath of the Newport canal walk through to

the Bridge Inn and an opportunity to visit more pubs in the market town of Newport.



For those coming from Shrewsbury catch the 519 bus from Shrewsbury Bus Station (Stand K) which runs through High Ercall and Tibberton to Edgmond. There's a haunting view of the Wrekin for most of the journey. Unfortunately, the Cleveland Arms at High Ercall still remains firmly closed, but the Sutherland Arms in the pretty village of Tibberton is open daily. However, on this occasion ask the driver for the stop by the Lamb at Edgmond. For those coming from Stafford and Telford, catch the Arriva 5 bus and change at Newport for the 519 bus to Edgmond, a ten minute journey.

First call on this linear walk is the Lamb Inn, originally a farm and inn belonging to the Chetwynd Estate. When we stepped in it had Doombar on tap. but there are more real ales promised when it re-opens. Now for the walk to Newport. Turn right out of the inn along Shrewsbury Road and as this bends slightly left go right through the car park to the recreation ground. Follow the path by the pavilion and basketball court through to a double kissing gate. Once you are through, walk ahead to join Pipers Lane. Cross over and use the path parallel to the sunken lane to a road which you cross. Follow the track ahead but in about 50 metres go left through a gate in the churchyard of St Peter's Church, note the unusual sundial by the entrance of the red sandstone church dating from 1080.

Follow through to the High Street and turn left, but after passing an old village water tap dating from 1900, cross




the road with care to go right down Connors Lane on the right. This gives out to a kissing gate. Head slightly left as signposted across a large field on a path which meets a track by woodland. Go right down to a junction and then left through a kissing gate.

Now proceed ahead to another kissing gate and once through follow the corralled path across pastures to a footbridge leading to a towpath alongside a remnant of the old Newport canal rich in water lilies and yellow flag at this time of year.



Keep ahead, ducking underneath a bridge and by the appropriately named Tickethouse Lock to the old roving bridge at Chetwynd End where you rise up to the main road. Go left here to visit the Bridge Inn, dating from the 17th century, at one time owned by the Cherrington family, but much altered in recent times. The Bridge offers a range of changing beers often from Black Country or

Shropshire brewers. Cross the road and turn right to walk up to the Swan, another old coaching inn which is every bit a community pub. The central bar serves a front and back bar and snug as well



as a fourth room. There are exposed beams, and shelves lined with plenty of characterful artefacts to muse over. We tried the Banks's Bitter and Marston's Old Empire IPA both of which were in excellent condition.

Make your way up the cobbled St Mary's Street to the left of St Mary's church to the town centre where you turn left along Stafford Street to find the New Inn, a Joules revival refurbished in 2016; it is popular with students from Harper Adams and local residents. It has several nooks and crannies as well as a more modern dining area. There's always a range of Joules beers on handpull as well as two guests. On this occasion, Rowton's Bitter, a pale ale, and Joule's Hawaii Five-Joe, an American style IPA, were very tasty. It is hard to believe that

this pub at one time housed a wheelright's, a blacksmith and stables. Times have changed, but Newport still retains several old coaching inns which makes a visit to this market town very worthwhile



For full opening times check WhatPub.

Lamb inn, Edgmond: at the time of going to press the Lamb Inn is closed for refurbishment and will re-open on July 11, 2019.

Unless it has been very wet weather you'll simply need trainers or stout shoes to walk along the canal towpath.

Buses are operated by Arriva, the No. 519 bus Shrewsbury and the No. 5 bus from Stafford and Telford. From Newport Interchange there's a bus to the Lamb at Edgmond. Full details can be found at arrivabus.co.uk or phone Traveline on 0871 200 2233


